DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES BREAKING THE BARRIERS

Nearly everyone faces hardships and challenges at one time or another. People with I/DD often face barriers that can limit their opportunities to lead a fulfilling life.

Many people are unaware of the challenges people with I/DD face and are unsure of how to be more inclusive and accessible to their needs.

Children with I/DD may require additional support services than other children. However, with supports, children with I/DD can still learn and thrive.

Children with I/DD have the right to a free and appropriate public education. A quality education for students with I/DD should maximize their life skills through greater education, occupational, and social opportunities with accessible critical supports and resources.

Many people with I/DD have fulfilling careers, however, only 44% of adults with I/DD aged 21-64 are in the work force. Many others are capable of working, but have not yet been given the opportunity.

People with I/DD can be employed in companies alongside people without disabilities and earn competitive wages. Through the support of diverse corporate partners we can eliminate misconceptions and biases about people with I/DD with the ultimate goal of removing barriers to employment.
